CONNECT

INTRODUCTION

Whether in the story of Exodus, the poetry of Isaiah, or the letters of Peter, Scripture is clear that we are priests. God has freed us, just like he freed the Israelites. He's called us to be "a holy priesthood," to reflect his holiness by our holiness.

How should that change the way we read God's word? Scripture is meant to transform us, to help us become more like the holy God we reflect to the world. We read Scripture attentively, because we become like what we pay attention to. As priests, we want to think, feel, speak, and act like God. And so, like a child learns by paying attention to her parent, we come to God's word attentive and ready to learn.

PRACTICE

Depending on who you are, you'll pay attention differently—but the important thing is to pay attention. If that means taking notes, take notes! If that means painting a picture of a biblical story, get out your watercolors! (Studying Scripture through making art is as old as Christianity itself). Half of learning to read the Bible is learning how you pay attention best. Take twenty minutes with your group and do the following exercise, to give people a sense of what a joy paying attention to Scripture can be.

EXERCISE

First, read Exodus 12:1-42 out loud, and pray that God would show you the beauty of his word. Then, take fifteen minutes to each silently pay attention to this passage. People should feel very free to study the passage however seems most likely to hold their attention; we've provided some possible ways to approach the passage below. Once the fifteen minutes are over, come back together and discuss what you saw!

SOME IDEAS...

- Visualize what's going on. If you'd like, imagine asking Christ about what you're seeing.
- Journal questions about the passage. Ask God about anything that confuses you in the passage.
- Journal praise to God for what's going on in the passage.
- Select a single chunk of the passage and meditate on it; close your eyes and consider it deeply, repeat it to yourself, consider each word individually and why it might be put there.

SOME IDEAS...

- Look for something in the passage that doesn't make sense on a first reading, or which is surprising. Try to make sense of it.
- Pray, using the passage as a starting place.
- Repent, using the passage as a starting place.
- Draw a scene from the passage. As you do, ask yourself: what details am I adding? Why? Are they hinted at in the passage? (It's fine if not; but it's a helpful question, and will make you notice things you wouldn't otherwise!)

SOME IDEAS...

- Try to memorize any verses that particularly stand out to you.
- Write a song or poem using imagery from this passage.
- Ask yourself: why did God put this here?
- Ask yourself: Does this passage remind you of anything else you've read in Scripture? Why might that connection be there?
- Ask yourself: how does this passage point towards Jesus?

PRAYER

“And we all, with unveiled face, beholding the glory of the Lord, are being transformed into the same image from one degree of glory to another.” (2 Corinthians 3:18).

Pray with us this week that you will find the face of God as you study his word, and that you'll be transformed more and more into his image. Take a moment to pray for one another (as priests should!), and include in your prayers the request that each of you encounter God this week, in Scripture and in prayer.

DISCIPLESHIP CHECK-IN

- Have you read your Bible and prayed consistently the past week?
- Who is one lost person you're praying would come to faith?



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
